How to turn in your application:

Drop off the completed application: student information section, parent and student signatures to the commitment policy, your answers to the student's questions, your parent(s)/guardian(s) answers to their section, your teacher/coach recommendation, and your art piece (please observe the $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ size restriction) to room 235 (Mr. Magidman) by 4:00 pm Friday, April 20th. You will be required to interview the first week of May. Interview times will be posted on Thursday, April 26.

Upon acceptance into the program, please enroll in the Hands for a Bridge class on turnitin.com. Instructions to follow.

Class Requirement:

All HFB participants must take the year-long *Hands for a Bridge* class (period TBA) next year. You will receive LA option credit towards graduation. If selected, you will be automatically registered for this course. If there is a conflict in your schedule with the designated period, then you will have to make a choice.

Your commitment includes:

- weekly BEFORE school meetings
- monthly family potlucks
- two weekend retreats
- hosting/involvement with visiting students
- several fundraising events
- two weeks of international travel in February (one week is Mid-Winter Break)

These commitments will require significant time outside of school, particularly when we are hosting guests.

Student Questions:

For the following questions craft your answers clearly and thoroughly. Type your answers on additional pieces of paper and attach them to your application. Answers may vary in length, but take care to demonstrate as much careful thought as possible.

- 1. Why are you applying to Hands for a Bridge?
- 2. Write an informative "bio". Imagine you are introducing yourself to an overseas peer, his/her family and teachers.
- 3. Considering a community in which you participate, create a metaphor for the role you are most comfortable playing in that group.
- 4. Discuss your understanding of the term "social justice" and how it may apply to you.
- 5. Tell something of you that made you proud, and something that did not.
- 6. A former HFB class chose these words to represent their intentions: scholar, artist, activist, teacher. Select one or more of these words and create an art piece that illustrates how you see this/those concept(s) in the world and your relationship to the word(s). Your art may be verbal (prose, poetry no longer than 300 words) or visual (no larger than a sheet of notebook paper—it needs to fit in a file folder). Be unique. Avoid common clichés: trees, globes, flags, hands, bridges.

Commitment Policy:

Participation in HFB requires specific commitments that we want you and your family to understand completely.

- First, you must fulfill all your obligations towards our community-building and fundraising efforts during the summer, fall, winter, and spring of 2018-2019. These include weekly before school meetings, visitations, participation in retreats and fundraising responsibilities. In all of these obligations the most important element is communication. We want to know what your hurdles are, what you're struggling with, and what exceptions you need. If you have a schedule conflict or another challenge, then you need to talk with your HFB teachers proactively (meaning before the event, not after you have missed the requirement).
- Second, you will not consume or be under the influence of drugs or alcohol during any HFB or school function. This is non-negotiable, as it puts the safety and well-being of the program, the teachers, and other students at risk. Should you violate this policy, in addition to school sanctions, you will be removed from all of HFB related activities, including travel. These commitments ensure that we can trust each other and become a foundation for creating a rewarding and fulfilling group experience.

Section (1): About Hands for a Bridge

We hope this parent section will answer some of your questions, but we encourage you to attend an informational meeting for interested families on Tuesday, April 3rd at 6:30 PM, in RM 201.

Hands for a Bridge: HFB gives Roosevelt students the opportunity to engage with students from South Africa and Northern Ireland, regions where the history of oppression and civil strife has impeded essential dialogue between traditionally separated groups. Its mission is as follows:

Hands for a Bridge provides high school youth with opportunities to explore issues surrounding social justice in their local, regional and international communities. In collaboration with established partners, students engage in intensive artistic dialogue to build bridges of understanding across chasms of race, culture, wealth and poverty. These student leaders will emerge as transformed global citizens with vision and resources to effect vital change in our world.

HFB does not travel to these regions to teach, or to "show the way." America has its own difficult history of institutional segregation. Our students travel abroad to learn, to form questions and to participate in dialogue that helps to promote peace and understanding. Our strength is in our contextual neutrality. We are not burdened by the local attitudes, resentments and pressures created by memories of a history that runs deep. We are not current or former enemies. In that way we become the bridge.

In class, students will explore literature, history and politics, plot strategies for conflict resolution, provide opportunities for public dialogue and create a venue for artistic expression in our own communities and schools. Seattle is a city still facing issues of equity and justice along racial and economic lines. We will therefore be hosting students and teachers from South Africa and Northern Ireland to help bring the dialogue to our schools, to become our bridge.

Program Cost: The costs for the program are high; in 2017-2018 the cost was \$4,217 per student and; this cost may increase in 2018-2019. The cost per student pays for the travel to Northern Ireland or South Africa and the exchange to Seattle for our resource-poor student and teacher partners in South Africa and/or Northern Ireland. This exchange component of HFB is equal to, if not more valuable than, our travel there. The costs are high, but it's important that HFB is not a program just for those who can afford it. By using a collective debt model, **no student is disqualified from travel or event participation because his or her family cannot afford it.**

The Collective Debt Model: This model ensures that ALL students are able to participate regardless of their financial situation. At the beginning of the school year we ask families to fill out a confidential form indicating how much of the program cost they can commit to paying. We add up the financial commitments from the families and the balance left is our collective debt and fundraising goal. This means as a team of families you'll work to raise money for the entire HFB group, not your individual student. Since the program's inception in 2001, the families have successfully raised all necessary funds to meet the collective debt.

During visitations from our South African and Northern Irish partners you may choose to host students and participate in a number of community events.
